Social Media Safety for Educators

4. Personal and professional email and/or social media accounts or pages shall be kept separate. (Note: Please be mindful that information posted on "private" social media accounts or pages may still have an impact on your professional reputation.)

10. The PLSB does not recommend interactions with students and/or parents on personal social media accounts or pages. If interactions do occur on personal social media accounts or pages, be mindful of the following:

a. **Perception is everything.** What you post may be offensive or hurtful to those who are viewing it and may damage the professional relationships that you have with students, parents, and/or colleagues.

b. Know your district policies. Interacting with students on personal social media accounts or pages may violate your district's policies.

c. Private is not always private. Information may be taken off your personal social media accounts or pages and shared without your permission.

2. Professional social media accounts or pages should be transparent. It is highly recommended that professional social media accounts or pages remain accessible to administration or the district designee. Administrators or the designee should regularly monitor professional accounts.

3. Parents/guardians shall be notified of the purpose of professional social media accounts or pages and written permission shall be obtained prior to including students on professional social media accounts or pages.

7. Images, audio, or videos of any school activities or students should not be digitally transmitted or streamed without prior written parental consent and/or must adhere to local district policies.
